

The Croft Institute offers the international studies major, which is the University of Mississippi's premier program for undergraduates who want to expand their horizons.

Croft offers the benefits of a small private institution selective admission, small classes, and academic rigor with the advantages of a large public university — affordable tuition and a wide range of opportunities. The international studies major combines a focused curriculum in Oxford with a semester or year of study at a foreign university.

The Croft Institute was established in 1997 and to be funded by the Joseph C. Bancroft Charitable & Educational Fund.

THE MAJOR



International studies is an interdisciplinary major in the College of Liberal Arts. It focuses on the connections between **politics, economics, and culture at the international level,** providing students with an understanding of how the contemporary world works.

Students develop both qualitative and quantitative skills: they hone their **writing ability** and learn to perform statistical analyses. They also study a **foreign language** intensively, including at least **one semester abroad**.

Small classes taught by the Institute's professors foster discussion, reflection, and analysis. Croft students also take courses taught by university faculty in other departments that count for the major, giving them a wide variety of choices.


FOREIGN LANGUAGE: The goal is for Croft graduates to be able to live, study, and do business in their chosen language. Students take foreign-language courses through the Department of Modern Languages every semester in order to reach the high level of oral proficiency expected of international studies majors.

STUDY ABROAD: Croft students study abroad, either for a semester or a whole year, in a country where their chosen language is spoken. It is the experience of a lifetime, a period of intense personal and intellectual growth. They study the language and take courses that count for the regional and thematic requirements of the major.

SENIOR THESIS: All International Studies majors complete a two-semester senior thesis. They work one-on-one with a faculty mentor to carry out a substantial research project and produce a scholarly paper. The thesis draws on all the skills students have acquired and prepares them for future success.



Combinations

he B.A. in International Studies is flexible in its own right, but it can also be combined with **other programs and majors and minors**.

The most common additional majors and minors students pursue are their languages: Spanish, French, Italian, German, Russian, Arabic, Japanese, Chinese, and Korean.

Other Special Programs:

SALLY MCDONNELL BARKSDALE Honors College

The majority of International Studies majors are also members of the Honors College, and these two programs complement each other well.

CHINESE AND ARABIC FLAGSHIP Language programs

These federally-funded intensive critical language programs are separate from the Croft Institute, but students wishing to pursue one of these languages may be in both programs.

TRENT LOTT LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

International Studies majors can pursue a double major in Public Policy Leadership, which complements the International Governance and Politics concentration well.

CENTER FOR INTELLIGENCE AND SECURITY STUDIES

International Studies majors interested in government and intelligence careers often choose to pursue this competitive minor.

CENTER FOR MANUFACTURING EXCELLENCE

Students that are in the Croft Institute may also be in the CME, which allows business-oriented students to understand the world of modern manufacturing.

PRE-MED TRACK

Croft students that wish to attend medical school can concentrate in Global Health, and work with the Health Professions Advising Office to fulfill their prerequisites.



Croft Scholarships

CROFT SCHOLARS: The Institute awards eight scholarships each year to its most competitive incoming freshmen. They receive \$8,000 per year for up to four years. These are among the largest and most prestigious scholarships available at the University. A Croft Scholar pursuing the dual degree in international studies and accountancy may be eligible for a fifth year of support.

ROSE BUI MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE: Each year, the Institute awards one scholarship (\$8000 a year for up to three years) to the top rising sophomore who does not already have substantial scholarship support.

MIKE AUNE MEMORIAL

SCHOLARSHIP: This Institute awards this scholarship to one student concentrating on Latin America.

FOREIGN STUDENT

SCHOLARSHIP: The most competitive foreign student in the Institute receives a scholarship (\$9,000 per year).

These scholarships may be combined with most other forms of financial assistance.

Other Scholarships

Many of the recipients of the University's most prestigious scholarships are Croft students.

Stamps Leadership Scholarships* — Full cost of attendance plus \$12,000 stipend over four years (\$98,000– \$160,000 total value)

Carrier and Newman Scholarships* — \$10,000 a year for four years

Chinese Flagship Scholarships* — \$8,000 a year for four years

Honors College Scholarships* — \$8,000 a year for four years

*Note that these scholarships cannot be combined with the Croft Scholarship.

Lucky Day Scholarships

(for Mississippi residents only) — \$2,000–\$5,000 a year for four years

Academic Excellence

— \$1,500–\$23,000 per year for four years depending on test scores, high school GPA, and residency

HOW TO APPLY TO CROFT



How to Apply to Croft

- Apply for general admission to the University of Mississippi at [olemiss.edu/applynow/].
- 2. Complete and submit the Croft section of the Special Programs and Scholarship Application at [olemiss.edu/applynow/supplemental]. The full application consists of the transcript, résumé, personal statement, general essay, and letters of recommendation shared by all special programs and scholarships as well as the Croft essay and information about language choice and academic interests.

The strongest applicants are those who can demonstrate an interest in the politics, economics, and cultures of the world, are excited about learning a foreign language and studying abroad, and want to challenge themselves in an academically rigorous program.


They typically rank near the top of their high school class and have a composite score of 29 or higher on the ACT (or the equivalent scores on the math and critical reading portions of the SAT or SATR) or are valedictorian or salutatorian of their high schools. The Croft Institute always encourages students with extensive international experience to apply.

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Croft Alumni

It is impossible to describe a "typical" Croft graduate. Because of the program's flexibility, our students gain a wide range of skills, which, when combined with their motivation, passion, and intelligence, make them competitive for careers in a variety of fields. A Croft graduate might be the director of finance and operations for an international non-profit organization, a foreign affairs officer for the U.S. Department of State, or an account manager for a European sustainable energy consulting firm.

About half of our graduates work in the private sector, while the rest are split between education, the non-profit sector, and local, state, and national governments. The majority of our alumni will obtain one or more graduate degrees at some point in their careers, typically a Masters or J.D., and occasionally a doctorate or even medical degree.
